# **Economic Transformation and Regional Stability at Fore Front During Ambassadors Conference 2024.**

Jinja - The Ministry of Foreign Affairs Uganda convened its Ambassadors' Conference from August 26-30, 2024, at the Civil Service College in Jinja. Gen. Odongo Jeje Abubakhar, Minister of Foreign Affairs, emphasized the crucial role of Uganda's diplomatic missions in aligning with the nation's development frameworks, particularly Vision 2040 and the Third National Development Plan.

He stressed that economic and commercial diplomacy should be at the forefront, with ambassadors tasked to drive value addition, industrialization, and trade. "Economic and commercial diplomacy has taken center stage in our foreign policy work," Gen. Odongo said. He urged ambassadors to leverage their positions to attract investment, technology, and expertise essential for Uganda's economic transformation.





The Minister also highlighted the significance of regional cooperation, pointing to the East African Community (EAC) and the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA) as vital frameworks for boosting intra-Africa trade. He asserted that these regional mechanisms are strategic pillars supporting Uganda's national development ambitions.

In addition to economic diplomacy, Gen. Odongo addressed regional peace and security issues. He called for proactive engagement in addressing conflicts in the Democratic Republic of Congo, Sudan, South Sudan, and Somalia, stressing Uganda's role in fostering stability and cooperation within the region.

Permanent Secretary Bagiire Vincent Waiswa highlighted the need for effective and efficient approaches to promote economic and commercial diplomacy, particularly in areas such as agro-industrialization, tourism promotion, mineral development, and science and technology (ATMs).

PS Bagiire re-echoed the importance of mobilizing Ugandans in the diaspora for national development, and promoting international law and commitments. "We need to have a concerted effort to attract investors, eliminate non-tariff barriers, and enhance trade relations," he said."

The Ministry has participated in coordinating and mobilizing grants for national development, including the Chinese Government grant of US\$5.3 million to finance the MoFA Extension building project." Waiswa commended some Heads of Mission for heeding guidance on effective service delivery but expressed concern over others who have disregarded official guidance, leading to acrimonious situations.



On the sidelines of the conference, Mr. Ramathan Ggoobi, Permanent Secretary in the Ministry of Finance, Planning, and Economic Development, highlighted the role of ambassadors in enhancing Uganda's economic growth through innovative branding and marketing strategies. He emphasized the potential of tourism as a critical area for growth and outlined Uganda's ambitious target to double its economy every five years, despite challenges.

PS Bagiire acknowledged the substantial, albeit often unseen, impact of the Ministry's efforts. He cited notable achievements such as the Jinja Bridge project, the Karamoja airport, and the polytechnic institute funded by Sharjah as examples of successful diplomatic engagements. The conference aimed to enhance performance and innovation among Uganda's diplomatic missions, facilitate peer-to-peer knowledge sharing, and promote both regional and international peace and security.

## Uganda to Host Pivotal 2025 Summit on Africa's Agricultural Future.

Kampala - In a significant move, Uganda has agreed to host a major summit on Africa's agricultural future, scheduled for January 9-12, 2025.

This decision follows a courtesy call on August 8, 2024, by the Alliance for a Green Revolution in Africa (AGRA) and the African Union to Uganda's Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Agriculture, Animal Industry and Fisheries.



The discussions centered on the post-Malabo Kampala Declaration roadmap, a critical initiative for accelerating agricultural growth and transforming livelihoods across the continent. In 2014, The African Union Summit in Malabo, Equatorial Guinea adopted concrete agriculture goals to be achieved by 2025.

The summit emphasized agriculture's importance in Africa's development agenda, as it is a critical policy initiative for economic growth and poverty reduction.

As Uganda prepares to host this landmark event, the Minister of Agriculture will seek the endorsement of both the Cabinet and the President. This summit is expected to assess progress since the Malabo Declaration and forge a path for shared prosperity and improved livelihoods through agriculture, highlighting Uganda's leadership role in Africa's agricultural transformation.

## Minister Odongo Reiterates Demand for Africa's Seats at UN Security Council.



**UN, New York** - Uganda's Minister for Foreign Affairs, Hon. Gen. Odongo Jeje Abubakhar, addressed a critical issue during the United Nations Security Council debate under the agenda item "Maintenance of International Peace & Security" on August 13, 2024.

He highlighted the historical injustice and unfair exclusion of Africa from key positions within the UN Security Council. Despite Africa's substantial contributions to UN peace operations and its prominent presence on the Council's agenda, the continent continues to be underrepresented in the decision-making processes.

Hon. Odongo emphasized that Africa, which is home to over a billion people and numerous ongoing conflicts, is unjustly sidelined in discussions that directly impact its future. He argued that this exclusion not only diminishes the credibility of the Security Council but also perpetuates a legacy of inequality that has persisted for decades.

The minister called for urgent reforms to ensure Africa's rightful representation, asserting that global peace and security can only be achieved when all voices, particularly those most affected, are heard. His message was clear: the time has come to correct this longstanding imbalance.

## President Museveni and Lesotho's Prime Minister Explore Agricultural and Educational Partnerships


**Entebbe** - President Yoweri Kaguta Museveni on August 13, 2024 hosted the Prime Minister of Lesotho, Rt. Hon. Sam Matekane, at State House, Entebbe. The two leaders emphasized the importance of strengthening the longstanding ties between Uganda and Lesotho.

He highlighted Uganda's agricultural potential, noting the country's self-sufficiency in food production, with a surplus in milk, which Uganda exports to countries like Algeria and the Middle East. He invited Lesotho to invest in Uganda's dairy sector and offered scholarships for Lesotho's youth to study agriculture in Uganda.

The President also recalled the historical connection between the two countries, mentioning that many Ugandans found refuge in Lesotho during Idi Amin's regime. He expressed Uganda's readiness to collaborate with Lesotho in medical fields, particularly in vaccine development, and suggested establishing a Memorandum of Understanding to formalize this cooperation.

Prime Minister Matekane, expressed gratitude for the warm welcome, commending Uganda for its leadership in the AU Peace and Security Council and its economic progress.

He introduced Lesotho's candidate for Commonwealth Secretary-General, Mr. Joshua Phoho Setipa, seeking Uganda's support. President Museveni expressed his support for Lesotho's candidate and accepted an invitation to attend Lesotho's 200th anniversary of its founding.

# President Museveni and King Mswati III Advocate For A Unified African Market and Stronger Political Ties.



Entebbe & Jinja - On August 14, 2024, President Yoweri Kaguta Museveni, accompanied by First Lady Janet Museveni, warmly welcomed King Mswati III of Eswatini accompanied by his wife, Queen Inkhosikati Make Lamashwama, and their delegation at Entebbe International Airport for a significant three-day state visit. This visit marked an important milestone in strengthening the relationship between Uganda and Eswatini, with discussions centered on unifying African markets and enhancing political cooperation.

During their meeting at State House Entebbe, President Museveni emphasized the critical need for a unified African market to achieve continental prosperity. Drawing from his experiences as a student activist and liberation leader, he stated, "If Africans want prosperity, it comes from producing goods or services and selling them."





He warned against the dangers of a fragmented market, noting that Africa's potential could be stifled, similar to Latin America, which, despite its natural wealth, struggles with poverty due to its fragmented markets. President Museveni called for a cooperative model where African nations not only produce but also share in the benefits of their resources.

He highlighted Uganda's petroleum sector as an example, inviting East African nations to co-invest in infrastructure such as pipelines and refineries, asserting, "It's not common sense that I produce, and you only buy. You can't say that to a brother."

King Mswati III echoed these sentiments, advocating for stronger cooperation among African nations. "If we work together, there is much we can achieve. But if one country moves on its own, it cannot go far," he remarked.

The King also proposed establishing regular communication channels between Uganda and Eswatini to strengthen ties and ensure that existing agreements are upheld. He further suggested opening direct flight routes between the two countries to boost trade and tourism, emphasizing Uganda's rich natural attractions like the Nile River and mountains as significant tourism draws.

The visit also fostered discussions on cultural and economic collaboration. King Mswati III highlighted the cultural similarities between Uganda and Eswatini, proposing the organization of cultural festivals to promote tourism.

Additionally, King Mswati III extended an invitation to President Museveni for a reciprocal visit to Eswatini, reaffirming the importance of continued collaboration. The visit culminated in the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding, further solidifying the relationship between the two nations.



# From Fruitful Beans To Yummy Bars As Ugandan Cocoa Opens Doors For Agricultural Exports.

The cocoa value chain in Uganda is brimming with opportunities, as highlighted by a recent report from the Uganda Coffee Development Authority (UCDA).

They explain that they are working closely with partners, including the European Union in Uganda, to significantly boost cocoa production and processing, opening doors for entrepreneurs to venture into the creation of value-added products like chocolates, cocoa butter, wines, and more.

A part of UCDA's broader efforts under the Market Access Upgrade Programme (MARKUP), it aims to address supply and market access constraints in key export-oriented sectors, particularly coffee and cocoa.

By enhancing the value of these exports to the European Union, the programme is set to contribute meaningfully to Uganda's economic development.

Uganda's recent success in the coffee sector underscores the potential for similar growth in cocoa. In the 2023/24 fiscal year, coffee exports reached an impressive 6.13 million bags, valued at US\$ 1.144 billion—a 6.33% increase from the previous fiscal year.

With Uganda Coffee enjoying high demand and the UCDA generating significant revenue UGX 82.2 billion in FY2023/24, the focus is now on replicating this success in the cocoa sector.

The BCCU is set to be a key player in advancing trade and investment between Uganda and the UK. The establishment of the BCCU comes at a time when trade dynamics between the UK and Uganda are evolving, partly due to Brexit. Brendah Akankunda, a trade and investment policy analyst, noted that while Brexit has impacted trade volumes, it also presents new opportunities for Uganda to negotiate favorable terms directly with the UK.

For foreign investors and other nations, the BCCU's launch is a clear signal of Uganda's growing economic potential and its strategic value as an investment destination. The Chamber's presence demonstrates a commitment to enhancing trade relations and creating a conducive environment for international business. This development sets a precedent for other countries to consider Uganda as a prime location for investment, contributing to the country's economic advancement and global integration.



### Collectively, We Can Save Tomorrow's Climate Today!

The Earth's natural control system is vital for maintaining temperatures that support life and economic activities. This system relies on atmospheric gases such as water vapor, carbon dioxide, nitrous oxide, ozone, and methane.

These gases trap infrared radiation, reflecting it back to Earth, which causes warming and contributes to the current climate crisis.

Addressing this crisis requires bold and transformational actions from nation-states, non-state actors, and the private sector. Adaptation and mitigation strategies are crucial for achieving the 2015 Paris Agreement's temperature goals and safeguarding tomorrow's climate.

The challenge lies in achieving these ambitious goals given the disparities and capacities of different countries.

The central thesis to meeting this ambition is that nation-states must engage with each other in a fair, equitable, and balanced manner. This cooperation is essential for contributing to the global good and addressing the climate crisis effectively.

Adaptation and mitigation policies should be based on fair contributions from each country, including Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) and National Adaptation Plans (NAPs).

However, stark contrasts and realities exist between countries, groups, and individual efforts, influenced by special interests, lobbyists, civil society, and the private sector. This polarization and inequality add complexity to policy implementation, placing international cooperation and diplomacy at the heart of the response.

The importance of international cooperation was highlighted during the 8th Ministerial on Climate Action (MOCA 8) held in Wuhan, China, from July 22-23. World leaders discussed key issues that support global climate action and the implementation of long-term goals of the Paris Agreement.

The discussions underscored the fundamental differences among groups and the need for a shared ecosystem despite these differences. While there is some consensus on the climate crisis, disagreements emerge over responsibility. The United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) designates developed countries as primary contributors to climate response.

In contrast, the Paris Agreement attempts to involve all countries in climate action while reinforcing the principle of common but differentiated responsibilities.

An example of cross-country action is highlighted in the UAE consensus outcome, specifically the Global Stocktake (GST) Decision 1/CMA.5. This decision emphasizes the importance of conserving, protecting, and restoring nature and ecosystems to achieve the Paris Agreement's temperature goals.

It includes efforts to halt and reverse deforestation and forest degradation by 2030 and supports investment in financial resources, technology transfer, and capacity building.

Similarly, the UAE dialogue (paragraph 98, Dec 1/CMA.5) calls for a follow-up dialogue on the adequacy of financial provisions, an enabling means of implementation (MOI), for actions and international cooperation among Parties to implement the GST outcomes. Paragraph 120 of the GST addresses carbon capture, usage, and storage, acknowledging the challenges of deploying this technology without resorting to magical thinking.

Climate finance is crucial for implementing climate action. Developing countries emphasize the need for sufficient finance beyond the promised \$100 billion, addressing systemic barriers such as high capital costs and limited fiscal space.

The discussions in Wuhan highlighted three key pillars: legal responsibility for emission reductions, ethical and moral questions about who should act first, and scientific questions about who has the right to emit within the remaining global carbon space, considering the historical responsibility of developed countries.

# African Union Support and Stabilization Mission (AUSSOM) To Replace African Union Transition Mission In Somalia (ATMIS).

Mogadishu - On January 1, 2025, Somalia will experience a pivotal transition in its peacekeeping landscape as the African Union Mission in Somalia (ATMIS) hands over responsibilities to the newly established African Union Support and Stabilisation Mission (AUSSOM). This change marks a significant step in Somalia's ongoing journey towards stability and self-reliance, reflecting a renewed commitment by the African Union to support Somalia in consolidating peace and security across the region.

Somalia occupies a strategic location on the Horn of Africa shores of the Red Sea and the Indian Ocean which is one of the most crucial trade routes in the world. It has the longest national coastline (3333 km) in Africa, which links the hinterland with the Arab coast.

Due to its location, Somalia acts as a cultural and trade bridge between Africa and Arabian Gulf countries including Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, Yemen and the UAE. Somalia is now the 8th Member of the East African Community (EAC).

and the establishment of the Transitional National Regarding. The country witnessed both insecurity.

Between the fall of Siad Barre's government in January 1991 and the establishment of the Transitional National Government in 2006, there was no central government in Somalia. The country witnessed both insecurity, destruction, business collapsed causing mayhem and agony.

With the intervention of the International Community, Regional and International stabilization forces deployed in Somalia have evolved during this period as follows:

AMISOM: On 6th March 2007, Uganda Peoples Defense Forces (UPDF) pioneered a deployment to actualize the United Nations Security Council Resolution 1744 (2007) which mandated the establishment of the African Union Mission in Somalia (AMISOM). Uganda was later joined by Burundi and other Contingents followed. The UPDF intervention has to a large extent paid off.

Beyond military victories against Al-Shabaab, UPDF achievements can be evaluated in terms of political and socio-economic development ushered in by the relative secure environment and subsequent political transitions including conducting of peaceful elections.

**ATMIS:** The United Nations Security Council mandate for the African Union Mission in Somalia (AMISOM) ended on 31st December 2021. The Mission had operated for fifteen (15) years in Somalia with significant impact, primarily to support the Federal Government of Somalia and its institutions against Al-Shabaab's insurgency. It was transformed into ATMIS effective 01st April 2022, **with the following mandate**:


Reduce the threat posed by Al-Shabaab.

Conduct a phased handover of security responsibilities to Somalia Security Forces (SSF).

Support capacity building of the integrated Somali Security & Police Forces (SNA/SNP). Support peace and reconciliation efforts in

The ATMIS draw-down was authorized by the UNSC Resolutions 2628 & 2670 (2022) and 2687 (2023) as well as 2710 & 2719. Drawdown was conducted and still on-going as follows;









**AUSSOM:** As the mandate of the ATMIS concludes on December 31, 2024, a new chapter begins with the establishment of the African Union Support and Stabilization Mission in Somalia (AUSSOM). Set to commence on January 1, 2025, this new mission was endorsed by the African Union Peace and Security Council (AUPSC) through Communique PSC/PR/COMM.1225(2024), which approved the Concept of Operations (CONOPs) for AUSSOM, outlining its role in continuing the vital work of stabilizing Somalia in the post-ATMIS era.

With the African Union Mission is in its transition phase, Somali Security Forces will soon assume security responsibilities as has been the case in the recent draw-down of ATMIS. The Major tasks for AUSSOM are: -

- Support SSF by employing appropriate force enablers and multipliers;
- Support SSF, within its capabilities, in its offensive operations against Al-Shabaab;
- Expand the establishment and strengthen the joint operations and logistics bases in all sectors to enhance the conduct of joint and independent operations, as well as the reporting and monitoring of service delivery and logistics support;
- Support vetting, recruitment, training, advising of the Somali Police Force (SPF) as requested;
- Leverage the capacities and support of relevant departments of the AU Commission and other AU Organs where appropriate, and as will be determined by the FGS and the AU;
- Support the forces pledged by T/PCCs to carry out their mandates in compliance with international law including IHL and IHRL, with regard to the protection of civilians, especially women and children, in line with the AUCF, and cooperate with the UN entities in Somalia in implementing the HRDDP across the preparatory, conduct and review phases of operations;
- Support the facilitation of safe passage, humanitarian access and humanitarian assistance to vulnerable populations including through protection of humanitarian personnel and objects, as may be required;
- Monitor incidents and receive reports on allegations of violations of IHRL, IHL, standards of conduct and discipline, investigate and take appropriate response and remedial actions to ensure accountability.

Uganda with her strong Pan-Africanism credentials remains committed to ensuring a successful transition to AUSSOM and being an ardent support and promoter of peace, security, stability and development in Somalia, the region and entire African continent.




However, in the finals, they faced stiff competition from Robots Mali, the national team of Mali, and the host nation, Senegal.

I'm still trying to find a way to overcome this problem, and now I need help from the Ugandan Government since I'm raising the Ugandan flag here in Sweden. There's nothing like this here," he explains.

Despite these challenges, Boogie Bytes has become a popular spot for people from all over the world. "All nationalities visit my restaurant," Chef Bogere notes, although he often has to explain and offer samples of foods like Rolex to those unfamiliar with them.

The most popular items on the menu among non-Ugandans are Samosas and Rolex, demonstrating the universal appeal of these Ugandan street food staples.

Chef Bogere points out that, aside from Ugandans, other nationalities especially East and Central Africans often find his restaurant through social media platforms.

He highlights that his customers keep coming back because, as he confidently states, "I make the best food in the world."

His dedication has also afforded him the opportunity to serve diplomats at the Ugandan Embassy in Denmark, the Rwandan Embassy, and high-profile Swedish dignitaries from traditional, political, and entertainment circles.

Across the Atlantic in the United States, Chef Paul Ofwono has been running Hakuna Matata Grill (Hakuna Matata Kitchen & Bar) for 15 years. His menu is rich with Ugandan delicacies such as Goat Stew, Katogo, Coconut Beans, and Samosas.

Like his counterpart in Sweden, Chef Ofwono faces challenges sourcing fresh products and a variety of spices, but he has taken proactive steps to address these issues. "I've launched an import and export company to combat the shortage challenges," he explains.

This initiative has not only ensured a steady supply of ingredients but has also opened up new avenues for promoting Ugandan cuisine.

Chef Ofwono's restaurant attracts a wide range of customers, including Africans, Americans, Spanish, and Europeans living in the diaspora. The favorite dish among non-Ugandans has been Goat Stew with Katogo.

Chef Ofwono has been discovered by customers through internal marketing, social media, and local media. He notes that people keep coming back because they love the authentic taste of Uganda.

His restaurant has hosted a number of high-profile guests, including Maryland state council members, State County representatives, the Minister Counselor of the Uganda Embassy, and the Third Secretary of the Uganda Embassy.

One of Chef Ofwono's proudest achievements is representing Uganda's cuisine at the World Bank in Washington, DC, for Uganda Heritage Day, where he won first place.

He also catered the 2022 UNAA convention in San Francisco, further solidifying his reputation as a top Ambassador of Ugandan food in the U.S.A.

In South Africa, Chef Hannington Kasirye operates Hannington's Braai, located at 28 Villa St. Clydesdale, Pretoria.

With over 15 years of experience, Chef Hannington creates a variety of Ugandan cuisines, including Goat Meat, Chicken, Pork Chops, Beef Steak, Sweet Potatoes, Cow Hooves, Chapati, Boerwors, Fish, Boiled Oxtail, Garlic Rolls, Pap, Chakalakka, and Vegetable Salads.

He sources his ingredients from local butcheries like Blu Bulls Butchery by Bosman Train Station and Uityk Butchery in Silverton, Pretoria.

For spices, he often imports from Uganda, particularly favoring the yellow curry in the metallic tin (Simba curry) and ingredients used in Pilau.

Chef Hannington explains that his clientele has been diverse over time, & includes nationals from Uganda, Kenya, Tanzania, Rwanda, D.R. Congo, Ghana, Zambia, and South Africa.

He has also attracted clients from Namibi, Swaziland, Zimbabwe, among others. The favorite items for non-Ugandans are Boerewors, Garlic Rolls, and Chakalakka.



Non-Ugandans usually find Chef Hannington through his Facebook page, HANNINGTON'S BRAAIS, as well as Instagram posts and word of mouth.

He emphasizes that people keep coming back because he is "good at what he does."

As the Chief Braaier for the Uganda High Commission, all their dignitaries have tasted his meat.

## Uganda's Performance at the 2024 Summer Olympics Paris 2024.

The Uganda Olympic team's inauguration at State House Entebbe on July 16, 2024, was led by H.E. President of Uganda Gen. Yoweri Kaguta Museveni, with esteemed dignitaries like Hon. Janet Kataaha Museveni, the First Lady & Minister of Education & Sports, and the Delegation Head, Hon. Peter Ogwang, Minister of State for Sports.

Led by Team Captains Joshua Cheptegei in Athletics and Kathleen Noble in Rowing, the athletes achieved new personal best times and national records. The team consisting of 25 athletes, showcased impressive performances at the Paris Summer Games 2024.

The standout moment came when Joshua Cheptegei clinched gold in

Peruth Chemutai also shined by winning silver in the Women's 3000 meters Steeplechase while setting a new national record.

Globally, Uganda tied for 55th place with Botswana, Chile, and St. Lucia. In Africa, **991 athletes** from various sports participated, with Kenya leading the African Medal Table with 11 medals. Uganda's success saw them tied for 7th place in the medal rankings alongside Botswana.

Upon their return, the team was honored with a welcome dinner & recognition at Uganda's Parliament. Government awarded Joshua Cheptegei UGX 100 million for his gold medal, Peruth Chemutai UGX 50 million for her silver medal, and provided each participating athlete with an allowance of UGX 29 million.

I'd also like commend Uganda's Envoy to France, Amb. Doreen Ruth Amule and her Team for hosting Team Uganda to an evening cocktail at Uganda's Mission in Paris for providing logistical support to our guests during the Games.

#### Demise of Marathoner REBECCA CHEPTEGEI.

## **BOOK REVIEW**

**THE REVIEW:** The World is Ours is a perfect blend of romance and adventure with the right dosage of plot twists to keep you hooked.

At 741 words, this coming-of-age story following the lives of Ameena, Shenzi, and Kevin through three decades and across four countries: Uganda, Kenya, Congo, and the USA.

The novel is divided into four books or parts, with each book exploring the transition of the characters: Books one and two explore Ameena's life, while books three and four focus on Shenzi and Kevin.

The four books are interlinked to create a powerful, poignant story with strong thematic areas of love and loss, betrayal, culture and gender, tradition, politics, and dominion.

The book's narration is through multiple voices, which aptly capture the characters' emotions and perspectives. The reader is not quick to judge them, thus defying the danger of a single story, as Chimamanda admonishes.

The plot is character-driven, with vital characters well fleshed out. The story is imbued with information about Somali Culture and folklore, which enriches it greatly. Readers will have an opportunity to learn something new upon reading this book.

### The World Is Ours.

The novel is well-researched and provides great insights about Kampala's Street life and the mining in Congo. It reveals how capitalists are profiting from gold with the help of the locals. I felt like I understood how it all works.

The language is beautifully peppered with humour in English, Luganda, Swahili, and Somali, making the story palatable.

The novel is fast-paced and compelling, and the ending is superb; it felt like the perfect way to end an endless plot full of dark twists and turns.
